Mike Williams has lived in more than 40+ homes while in the foster care system and experienced homelessness within 2 years of aging out. Rather than becoming a statistic, he chose to use his story to give hope and inspiration to others and to advocate and create solutions for those raised in the system like he was. Mike has helped shaped Florida Laws and has assisted with the design/development of several statewide programs, such as My JumpVault, a software program that provides instant access to health and personal records to youth, foster parents, & social workers (For more info visit: http://www.myjumpvault.org).

In 2015, he launched My Jumpstart, a youth development organization that provides experiential learning services to promote confidence, strategy and resilience in young adults as they transition to independence. My Jumpstart is now known for their statewide youth conferences, My Jumpstart to Independence.

Today, he is the President and CEO of DASH leading a social service team of experts that plans to launch 21 more homes to serve a total of 100 young adults annually. Mike was also named in Forbes NEXT 1000 for being a bold and inspiring entrepreneur on his way to great success. He is redefining what it means to build and run a business today, especially in the "new normal."

Succession Planning and Why Nonprofits Should Prioritize This Now

Session #1: 10:15 - 11:45AM

Succession Planning is an essential element for nonprofits to ensure leadership continuity in the event of any key changes in personnel within the organization. A good plan will outline how they'll cover the necessary workload, pull together a team, and ensure the success of a new leader. Without developing a well-thought-out nonprofit succession plan, organizations open themselves up to serious performance risk. If they are unable to effectively bridge the knowledge gap after a key member departs, there's also the risk of losing the support of board members and donors.

Generational Leadership

This session will provide a range of ideas on how to approach generational shifts in leadership so that the contributions of long-time leaders are valued, new and younger leaders' talent is recognized, and groups are better prepared to work across generational divides. Giving context to these differences, participants will explore the current assumptions about the upcoming transition between generations in the social sector; introduce new ideas or frames for thinking about generational leadership change; and examine how this change poses individual, organizational, and systemic challenges for those in the social sector. In addition, this session will provide numerous examples and practical exercises to show how to address these issues.

Building and Maintaining a Strong Team

One thing that leaders are often pondering is the performance and relationships of their team. Performance indicators show that effective teams will almost always outperform people working individually, particularly in high-pressure situations or when multiple skill sets are needed. This should not come as much of a surprise, as most organizations are recognizing the importance of team building in employee recruitment and retention as well as productivity. However, building effective teams requires more than an abstract commitment to teamwork; it requires input from managers to foster it. Without team building skills, a manager risks limiting the productivity of their employees to what each member can do on their own, whereas if you foster team building you can unite your team around a common goal and attract and retain quality staff for your organization.



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Resilience & Self-Care

This track is focused on creating healthier and thriving communities and how to use all sectors to make better health possible for all residents. This track will focus on creating a complete picture of health, from physical environments, vulnerabilities, common practices and planning to strategies for resilience and self-care.

He has also won several awards and distinctions, including being selected as a Black Enterprise Be Modern Man; being presented a proclamation from the City of Dallas; was recognized by Sybrina Fulton, mother of Trayvon Martin; was featured in a nationally televised show "Mentoring Kings"; was featured in the Tallahassee Democrat, WFSU, WTXL, WCTV and 96.1 FM media outlets; and the Omega Psi Phi State of Florida Keeper of Records and Seal.

Carrie currently serves as the Executive Director of the Legal Aid Foundation of Florida (LAF) and CEO of LiveGive850, a real estate company. One of her most challenging and beloved roles was serving as the Director of Policy for a statewide domestic violence coalition where Carrie joined her coalition members and allies to lead the lobbying efforts of over 50 domestic violence agencies to successfully secure over \$18.635M in crucial funds during a time of political gridlock and two years with no state budget. Carrie was formerly appointed by the governor to serve on one of the premier policy, legislative, and justice administration boards in the country with an annual budget of approximately \$130M. As a board member and elected official, Carrie helped pass initiatives to increase funding for diversion programs and juvenile justice reform. Carrie has spearheaded numerous successful legislative initiatives, including immigration law victories such as the landmark Trust Act and VOICES Act, criminal justice reform measures including the elimination of the statute of limitations for childhood sexual assault survivors and incentive rehabilitation programs, the Equal Pay Act, the ERA in two states, assisted in passing (twice) Florida's juvenile diversion and expungement bills, and significantly increased state and federal funding for survivors of sexual assault, human trafficking, and domestic violence.



Talethia Edwards is a wife and mother of seven turned community leader and advocate, and now serves as the Executive Director of the Hands Up Project. Talethia has a long track record of serving in the Tallahassee community and the state of Florida. She is currently the President and Founder of the Greater Bond Neighborhood Association, where she created programs like Breakfast in the Park to feed the homeless a hot breakfast, she had parented with other organizations to host a underwear drive " Drop the Drawers" where over 1000 pair of underwear were donated and disturbed to needy families. Edwards developed a literacy fund that raises funds and partnership with financial institutions to incentivized community youth for meeting their reading goals and teach financial literacy skills and youth entrepreneurial ship skills; she has also organized Community Walks and Family Health days. Talethia works closely with local city and county government to help bring positive change to her community. She was named City of Tallahassee 2016 Neighbor of the Year. Talethia believes in strong families and strong communities and exemplifies this through her service through board leadership for several organizations she holds dear to her heart. She is also Parent Partner for the ECCS state of Florida Team who are federal grantees working to decrease developmental delays in children birth to three there Talethia uses her voice to advocate and empower families to become active partners in their communities and children life. Talethia continues her commitment and advocacy through volunteerism and service through board work with agencies like Kids, Inc. of the Big Bend, Early Head Start, CACA Head Start, The PHI Center, Tallahassee Lenders Consortium, and committees like the Early Childhood Obesity Prevention (ECOP) task force, the Leon County school district advisory committee, and Title I advisory committee; and working closely with her community by serving as her neighborhood association president. She also serves on her children's school advisory committee, PTO vice president, and as parent partner for the Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems state of Florida team. As her commitment and service list goes on, she is firmly committed to forwarding the work of parental engagement, advocacy, and empowerment because she believes in strong families and strong communities.
